Where Resilience & Culture Meet: Trauma-informed Certification Training July 12th & July 19th 2022, 9am-12pm

Working in cultural heritage spaces, we encounter and communicate with a variety of individuals and groups, with a variety of experiences and histories. To ensure these public spaces are welcoming and safe for all, it is critical that staff be empowered and trained to respond to all visitors and situations in ways that are appropriate, humane and productive. Trauma-informed relational approaches are an important tool to assist in this.

Led by the Pathways to Education (Kingston) Team, trauma informed training provides participants with the knowledge on how trauma impacts a person's life and ability to function in the world. Based on current scientific insights and research, this training shares how to implement this knowledge into strategies and practices to address the underlying needs of those you are working with or service - in this case, the communities (staff, volunteers and visitors) of the cultural sector.

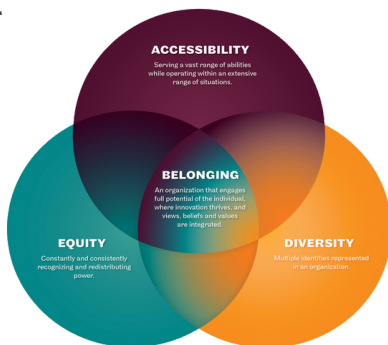
