The Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning is a charitable arts organization, operating the beautiful J.K. Tett heritage building on Lake Ontario's waterfront in Kingston. This historic building is owned by the City of Kingston and was fully renovated in 2015. It originally formed part of the Morton Brewery and Distillery Company, which was built in the mid-19th century. The J.K. Tett Centre is home to nine arts organizations (including the Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning), eight Creativity Studio Artists, a variety of rental spaces, and a cafe.
