

Kingston and its surrounding areas comprise a region rich in cultural heritage, with a vibrant and diverse selection of art galleries, libraries, museums, archives, and historic sites to explore. The City of Kingston alone has over 30 museums and historic sites, as well as 3 art galleries, which has earned it the nickname of, "Canada's Museum Capital". Add to this the many cultural heritage experiences on offer within a day-trip of Kingston, it's an opportunity that is impossible to resist.

Every year, these museums, galleries and historic sites offer visitors a place to escape, learn, and appreciate the many stories, communities, and places that define not only the local region, but also Ontario and Canada. We invite you to bring your students and explore some of these sites and organizations to learn from the site specialists and discover hidden histories, stories and places that make up our region's rich cultural heritage. Featured in this Education Program Guide are several sites that offer organized educational programs for 2023/2024. There are many programs to choose from that can be catered for individual classes, large tour groups, or for educational tours. Murney Tower Museum




The Murney Tower Museum is a community museum operated by the Kingston Historical Society in partnership with Parks Canada. It is located in one of the four Martello Towers of Kingston, Ontario and is part of the UNESCO World Heritage Site of the Rideau Canal and Kingston Fortifications. It is the oldest operating museum in Kingston with over a thousand domestic and military artifacts. The museum offers tours, programming and exhibits.

Murney Tower Tours

October 1st - December 1st 2023 April 1st - May 30th 2024

Our field trips include a guided tour of the Murney Tower and a discussion of the history of Kingston and last approximately 45-60 minutes.




Murney Tower Museum

Frontenac County Schools Museum




The Frontenac County Schools Museum opened to the public in 1979. Now located in the former Pittsburgh Township Hall and Library in historic Barriefield Village, visitors to the Schools Museum have the opportunity to enjoy our costumed schoolteacher in our replica 1899 classroom lessons, research one-room schools in Frontenac County from their earliest establishment to the consolidation of school districts in 1970, view artefact displays and reminisce about old school days.

Back in Time to 1899

The Brockville Museum




The Brockville Museum preserves and utilizes an evolving collection of objects and stories representing Brockville's past and present to provide inspiring, inclusive, and collaborative experiences that enhance well-being and strengthen the community's social and human capital in the service of Brockville's future.

A visit to the Brockville Museum offers a glimpse into the social and industrial history of Ontario's first incorporated town. Through a variety of thematic and interpretive displays the Brockville Museum shares the stories of the people who have shaped this riverfront community for over 200 years.

Museum Explorers (Social Studies)

Queen's University Educational Tour Programs


The Miller Museum offers hands-on curriculum-linked educational programs that are presented in the museum classroom for school groups of up to 30 participants. In a typical year, 100 programs are presented to school groups, summer camps, youth groups, and any other group interested in the science of geology.

The museum also participates actively in the Beyond Classrooms program (beyondclassrooms.ca) where your entire class can relocate to a museum, art gallery, or other historic site for a full week of activities each day.

Mineral Identification



During this engaging instructor-led program, students share kits of real mineral samples to perform hardness tests, streak tests, and many other diagnostic investigations using the samples. Coupled with the opportunity to see beautiful mineral samples in the museum galleries afterwards, this program functions equally well as an introduction to the topic or a wrap-up review for classes at the end of their study unit on rocks and minerals.



Meteorites

Please inquire with the museum to see what dates are available.

Students can touch different types of meteorites and find out what they tell us about the Earth, followed by 15 minutes in the museum galleries. Activities also include searching for micrometeorites (done by the students using microscopes and other equipment), and demonstrations about scale modeling of impact craters.



Dinosaurs

Please inquire with the museum to see what dates are available.

An introduction to fossils and paleontology, with emphasis on dinosaurs. Program presentation length varies from 20 minutes for the youngest audiences to 35 minutes for older groups. Children get to see and touch a variety of bone and tooth casts, and real fossils including a real dinosaur bone fossil and a dinosaur footprint fossil. A volunteer from the group is dressed up as a paleontologist to show the tools and equipment used by paleontologists. The group spends an additional 20 minutes of self-guided time looking at the dinosaur exhibits, and digging in the fossil dig box (sand box with fossil casts to uncover), and they can also look at the crystals and mineral displays in the rest of the museum.

Introduction to Geology

Learn about geology - the study of the Earth, during this engaging introduction to the various aspects of the science. An interactive overview of rocks, minerals, fossils and Earth processes illustrated with many touch samples (including a meteorite, a dinosaur bone, examples of igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic rocks and mineral ores) that are circulated around the group.



The Earth Through Time (Biology)

Please inquire with the museum to see what dates are available.

While seated along an 8-metre-long geological time scale graphic, students hear a 50-minute lecture about the major changes in the Earth's geosphere, atmosphere, biosphere and hydrosphere since its formation. The talk is illustrated with rocks and fossils spanning the entire 4.6 billion years of Earth's history including meteorites, the oldest known terrestrial rocks, the appearance of life, and its progression from exclusively single-celled organisms to the complex life of the present day.

Geology of the Kingston Area: 1.1 Billion Years of Earth History

Himalya-like mountains, tropical oceans, and a 2-kilometre-thick covering of glacial ice: these are some of the amazing events recorded in the rocks of the Kingston area over the past 1.1 billion years! The curator of the Miller Museum of Geology in the Department of Geological Sciences at Queen's University, will give a talk on the rocks, minerals and fossils of the region and explain what they show us about its fascinating geological past.

Beyond Classrooms Kingston




BCK fulfills a unique and significant role in Kingston's cultural heritage by providing youth access to week-long heritage learning experiences in Kingston's cultural heritage sites. Unlike a regular class field trip, BCK extends students' time to explore, engage with content experts, and take time to reflect on the collections. This enables students to develop skills and attitudes in novel ways. BCK programming encourages active citizenship and enhances critical thinking skills, empowering students to interpret and tell Kingston's stories.

Hands-on Learning with BCK

September 2023 - June 2024

Teachers can build a week of student-driven, inquiry-based learning that connects with the provincial curriculum and will be supported by heritage professionals and educators from some of Kingstons' cultural heritage sites. During the week, these sites become a space for students to absorb knowledge, discover stories, and engage with experts to understand a broad spectrum of historical narratives and experiences.

Year-round





Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning



The Tett Centre for Creativity + Learning (TCCL) is a charitable arts organization, operating in the beautiful J.K. Tett heritage building on Lake Ontario's waterfront in Kingston, Ontario. This historic building is owned by the City of Kingston and was fully renovated in 2015. It originally formed part of the Morton Brewery and Distillery Company, which was built in the mid-19th century.

The J.K. Tett Centre is home to nine arts organizations (including the TCCL), eight Creativity Studio Artists, and a variety of rental spaces, including the Malting Tower, Rehearsal Hall, Tett Gallery and Activity Room.

Kids Creativity Club

Improbable Escapes: Camp X


Year-round

The Message Must Get Through (Social Studies and History)

Year-round

The objectives of this educational program are to teach students about Major Wallace Bruce Matthews Carruthers the "father of military communications in Canada" and thereby give them an understanding of the beginnings of military signalling in Canada. Students will be guided by research questions and encouraged to think critically while examining primary documents. From these documents, students will glean information about Carruthers and the state of signalling in the Canadian military at the turn of the century.




Step into Kingston's first waterworks in operation from 1851 to 1952. Today, this magnificent building continues to serve the public as a community museum.

Tinker Tykes (Science and Social Studies)

September 1, 2023 - November 1, 2023 February 5, 2024 - November 15, 2024 (dependent on staffing and space)

Learners will explore simple machines through a tour of the historic PumpHouse machinery. This will be followed by hands-on building challenges in which they will use K'Nex to create their own machines. Content aligns with curriculum expectations in Science and Social Studies. This program is also open to non-school group bookings within those age ranges.



Museum Makers (Language and Social Studies)

Tuesday-Friday, February 5 -June 2024

Participants will learn about how museums use artifacts and spaces to tell stories. Learners will use their knowledge to design and present their own miniexhibitions. This program is offered in tandem with the *Stuff Stories Are Made Of* temporary exhibition, which will provide opportunities for learners to explore the breadth and diversity of Kingston's history through artifacts from the Civic Collection. This program is also open to non-school group bookings within those age ranges.







Trains & Tots (Early Years Programming)

Every Tuesday, June 4 - August 27, 2024

During this weekly toddler program, young learners will engage their minds and senses through a series of train-themed interactive STEAM (Science, Technology, Art and Math) activities. Programming takes place at the Discovery Centre.

Water Warriors (Early Years Programming)

Every Wednesday, June 5 - August 28, 2024

Dirt Detective (Science and Social Studies)

June - January, 2025

Through this program, participants will learn about the importance of healthy soil. They will investigate factors that lead to unhealthy soil and talk about steps they can take to help. Each participant will walk away with their very own compost container and knowledge about how to use it effectively. Content aligns with curriculum expectations in Science and Social Studies. This program offering is tied to the *Soil Superheroes* exhibition on loan from Ingenium. This program is also open to non-school group bookings within those age ranges.

Kingston City Hall, one of the finest 19th-century buildings in Canada and a nationally designated heritage site, is toured by thousands of tourists and local citizens each year. Kingston's historic City Hall has housed governments, a bank, dry goods, and the body of Sir John A. Macdonald.

Beards & Biases (Language and Social Studies)

February 5, 2024 - November 15, 2024 (dependent on staffing and space)

This subversive program will provide opportunities for participants to unpack how views of the past have changed through time. Learners will explore this concept through artwork present in the City Hall space and surrounding local architecture. Through this process, participants will develop a greater awareness of past and present biases within our society and how they contribute to marginalisation. Content aligns with curriculum expectations in Language and Social Studies. Program content aligns with the curriculum and is also open to non-school group bookings within the specified age ranges.



MacLachlan MacLachlan Woodworking Museum

The MacLachlan Woodworking Museum holds one of the most extensive collections of woodworking tools in Canada. Since the mid-1800s, the log house at the MacLachlan Woodworking Museum has witnessed many events and changes over the years. With each person to own it, the house has served different purposes and been transformed with physical additions and layouts.

Habitat Heroes (Science and Social Studies)

February 5, 2024 - November 15, 2024 (dependent on staffing and space)

In Habitat Heroes, participants will learn about local species and habitats while developing awareness of how their actions can help or harm local ecosystems. Content will include guided tours of the MacLachlan property, a stewardship-focused game and the opportunity to create bug hotels to take home. Content aligns with curriculum expectations in Science and Social Studies. Program content aligns with the curriculum and is also open to non-school group bookings within the specified age ranges.



MacLachlan MacLachlan Woodworking Museum

Nailed It! (Science and Visual Arts)

September 1, 2023 - November 1, 2023 February 5, 2024 - November 15, 2024

Nailed It! will teach participants about the variety of trees that can be found on the property, the differences between soft and hard woods, and how to use both heritage and modern tools while woodworking. Participants will use what they learned throughout the program to design and build a wooden creation to take home. Content aligns with curriculum expectations in Science and Visual Arts. This program is also open to non-school group bookings within those age ranges. Participants must be accompanied by guardians at a ratio of 1 adults for every 4 children.



Trees, Seeds, & Feathers (Science)

September 1, 2023 - November 1, 2023

Learn about the plants, animals and insects that are kind enough to share Grass Creek Park with us! Through a nature walk and hands-on exploration, learn to identify birds common to the area and how we can use their physical characteristics to glean clues about their habitats, diet and gender. Please note that the program includes an opportunity for students to handle taxidermy birds. Pair the Trees, Seeds and Feathers program with your choice of module: Papermaking or Bird Nests.






Historic House Tours

Located on the picturesque Rideau Canal waterway at Old Sly's Lock Station, the Smiths Falls Heritage House Museum functions as a community museum and historic house. It depicts the upper-middle-class life of the Bates Family circa 1865-1875 and features changing displays of Smiths Falls artifacts and history, travelling exhibits and art shows. 
Students will be taken around the grounds of the museum to explore and discover local plants, learn what their needs are, how they work, and their role in the environment and society.


A Soldier's Overnight
